("Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star" in the Style of Ted Greene) By Alan de Mause

Ted Greene

An indication of the popularity and interest surrounding solo jazz guitar is the number of fans Ted Greene has gathered in just a short while with only one record. Like so many jazz fingerstyle players, Ted was directly influenced by George Van Eps. Ted's knowledge of harmony is extensive. He can use chords so creatively that he makes a fresh sounding arrangement out of the old chestnut, "Danny Boy."

With this in mind I have made a Greene-like jazz reharmonization of a children's nursery song and called it "Star Chemistry."

Notice the voicing, the attention paid to each part of the polyphonic harmony under the melody, something Ted uses. Follow, for instance, the internal eighth note melody within the chords in measures 13-16.

Some other arranging techniques he uses are the harmonized scale (in a pattern of 5ths) such as in measures 1-4 of the introduction, and temporary key changes (here, to A minor instead of C major), in measure 8.

Ted plays with utter clarity and in tune on a Fender Telecaster.
